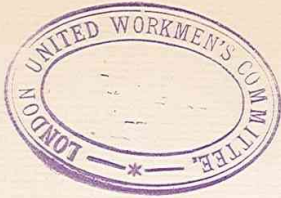

Adopted. At a Large Meeting of Working Men
held at the Central Club Rooms, 169 White End Rd
London. E. Feb 15th 1898

Resolved. "That this Meeting of Representative
Working Men. Composed of all Sections of the
Great Industrial Army of this Metropolis - but
Ardent lovers of Freedom - the wide world
begs to place upon record - their Profound Admiration -
at the Conduct of that Illustrous Man
M. Emile Zola - in so nobly championing
the Cause of Truth - Justice and Right - as
clearly illustrated in the extra-ordinary legal
and judicial Trial now proceeding in the
Capitol of France. And this Meeting - furthermore
begs to express the most sincere hope that the
Cause for which the Great Frenchman is contending
may prove successful - and earnestly trusts
that his wonderful genius - may be for ever
devoted to the Cause of oppressed races - and here
with tenders to him the most heart-felt thanks
of the Industrial Classes of London - for his
valuable and heroic defence (of the) of the down-
trodden Jewish population of France - whose
recent sufferings caused by unnecessary outrages
has filled us with indignation against the Author
of these crimes on the one hand - and profound sym-
-pathy with the persecuted Jewish Race on the
other."
