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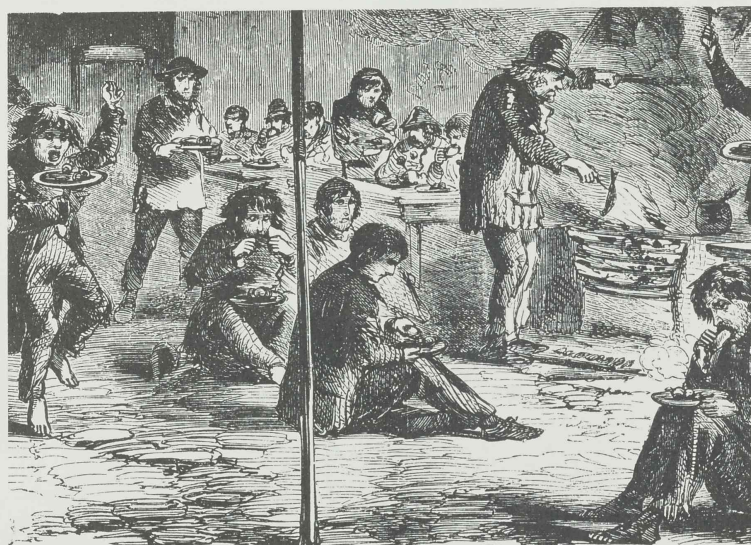

This standard broad-gauged study of how the Poor Law affected the lives of the mass of the labouring poor in the latter part of the seventeenth and during the eighteenth century is a classic work in social history. The study, which also includes a discussion of contemporary attitudes toward poverty, was drawn largely from evidence from Quarter Sessions Minute and Record Books, parish accounts, and papers as well as an abundance of contemporary pamphlet literature.

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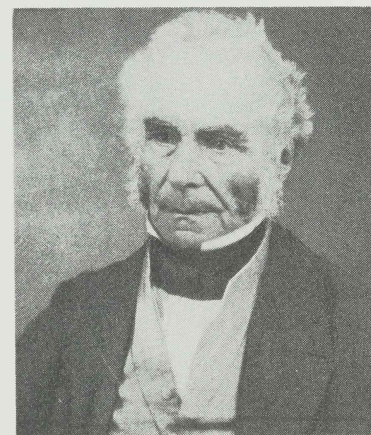
