Dear Mr. Guizot.

I have little to add to what has
already been in the French papers.

Country, and so unpopular a
question as the Chinese War -
so they prefer postponing it
& obtaining some little triumphs
on their Budget, which has been
expected. It is not known,
but I imagined the dissolution

will take place, about the end
of the month. Ministers
are desirous of making it
appear to the Country, they have
fallen victims to a Combination,
but one would have thought
that fact (for they had every
party against them) was a
sufficient proof how much they were
in the wrong. It is curious
that Mr. Parnham & Chandon
were the two in the Cabinet,
who thought the announcement
of the Operations in China
w^d. be received with applause!
