Sir

I have requested our common friend
M. Gallois to take charge, during
your absence from Paris, of a copy
of my recent work on the Constitutional
History of England, which I brought from
London in order to present it to you.
In the progress of your own researches
it is possible that you may sometimes
find these volumes not altogether
unhelpful, though you have already shown
the world that your knowledge of our

history is much too exact to stand in
need of assistance, by any native
writer. But I hope it will be satisfactory
to yourself, as it certainly has been
to me, that, following up our enquiries
nearly at the same time, but in different
countries, we have arrived in general at
nearly the same results, & that these appear
to be almost an exact coincidence in
the views we have taken of the important
reign of Charles I. It is, I think,
Villemain who has said: *quand on
parle, on ne s'explique point le même,
il faut bien qu'il aient raison -* &
without putting this conclusion quite so
positively, it may at least afford some
presumption that they have been guided

by a sincere
desire to truth
