It seems long since I have heard
of you, or at least from you,

just entered the 10th month of their
age - I cannot but feel when I look

at them, how little I shall behold
of their development - but perhaps my
life, which Providence has already
frustrated beyond the normal age of man,
may be spared till they can thank
me, & even have imprints which
they may recollect in later years. God
grant that you may long enjoy the
domestic happiness which surround you!
I much fear that our friend Bordeaux will
one day be deprived of his excellent wife.
For some time I have not heard of her, & do not
know & write, though I look shortly to her.
I have not heard of her some time since, when
his mother was, he said, rather better;
but she is not strong enough, I fear, to leave
Buckingham. It can only be a question of
time for recovery, I fear, in all the hopes.

we have been kept in perpetual oscillation
about public affairs - a more uncertain
course than Russia pursued in the first
instance could not be; but the brother
must always have something of the point of
knowing, & when Turkey has such good
friends as you & me, that is, our two
countries, it is the wiser course to be guided
by them - I avoid to have last steps of
expiring the disaster; whilst may defeat the
harmonizing efforts of our governments to
procure peace. The deed that could not
happen could be a decisive strategy in the
field obtained by the Turks - this would
alter their Mohammedan side & render
pacification more difficult. No one, I presume,
could expect any permanent killing of
Christians or European armies. There is at
present a spirit in this country, very much
opposed to the despising (present policy of
our friend Mr. Aberdeen, but I do not believe
it is deep, though the press is almost universally
