be the last, that I have been
an inmate of a French chateau.
Your hospitable & friendly reception
can never be forgotten by his John
or myself. Surrounded by those
you love, & with every real
enjoyment that life can furnish,
how little you have to envy in
those who are carried along
currents of life, & of they have to

Lorentzen, to Kilsnäs, & then we
got up our country, & by diligences to
Paris we remained two days there.

I am still kept away from India,
where work is not ready - in 2 weeks
I hope to sit down quietly at home -
she is there already - There of course are
less, but I think there will be no very
immediate change of our ministry.
Pray give my kind regards to your family
