all at Tal Nicker. I hope my dear
Perniere is well & continues to enjoy
her country life. Mine remains just
what it was, & is, I think, the only one now
suited to me.

My husband is quite well & as usual

 well & so is he. I am - proud as you
 have me - quite & often suffering, but in
 very moderate state.
