not see. Tomorrow
I have fixed to be off
at 8 A.M. to cross
over at 3.30 which
is too late; but better
than the succeeding
days. And now comes
fog - so thick this morn
that one could not see
cross the strait & if
the boats go they must
go at the slowest pace.
So I am unlucky
I shall be very contented
here in my little home

I am quiet & indepen-
dent. I ^{10 ft} is at
Ponzi's only comes
occasionally. But I am
devoured by anxiety
& I want to be with
my dear Alex

My arm has made
great progress for
the last 3 or 4 days &
~~was~~ painful today -
but I expect that &
you see I can write
what is the chief thing
I fear it will never
be straight - that is why
so I can but use it
It is on the whole a
very rapid reconvalescence

kind to me here, ~~espe-~~
sally Mr. M. de Beauvoir
Mr. Cousin is enthusiastic
