I cannot any longer refer
 to you. I must say
 that my heart is not changed
 towards you. I have said that
 as if I had nothing to
 say. Till now, I have lived
 in my work; but now
 will last but a few days
 longer, & I feel as if my life
 were done. I have indeed the
 constant pain of anxiety. It
 is a kind of life, but it has
 nearly worn me out. We have
 not heard from my dear
 since Dec her letter of 10th Dec.
 Not can we, quite yet. For
 this, Ross prepared us - a
 least forwarded us - prepared
 one can never be, for but

lingering tortures.

I did not write to tell you that my dear Alex. has given up his house at Esher - a very nice ~~step~~, but, to me, the loss of ~~the~~ last comfort - the frequent sight of him & my little darling. This leaves me absolutely alone. When my book is out, I think I must wander forth - somewhere to see if I can, this time of year. Mr. Senior, who goes to Paris in a few days, will, I trust, be the bearer of a little extract from my book. I have reprinted as a pamphlet, for reasons you will see. I think it will please you.
