Monsieur le Ministre,

My friend Mr Heywood requests me to present to you in his name a copy of Prof Huber's history of the English Universities, which Mr Heywood has had translated and printed at his own expense. Mr Heywood is a young man of considerable property, and is an influential person among a class of the English dissenters. He is a great advocate for educational and university reform, and with the object of advancing the latter by making public as much as possible the documents necessary to throw light upon the ancient and present state of the Universities, he is expending a considerable sum of money in printing the charters, statutes, &c. both of the Universities and of the separate colleges. I have asked for Mr Heywood two volumes of very interesting documents relating to the religious movements in the University of Cambridge in the reign of Queen Elizabeth, of which I hope to be able to send you a copy within two or three weeks, as it is nearly completed. Perhaps at your leisure you will be so kind as write a few words, to Mr Heywood and send the letter through me. He is at present in the Isle of Wight. He is the direct descendant of the Oliver Heywood whose life, written by Mr Kemler, I had the honour to send you a few months ago.

I take the liberty of sending with Mr Heywood's book the second volume of our *Reliquiae Antiquae*. I believe that you had the first volume complete in parts.
