Monsieur le Ministre,

I have been the means of establishing in England an Archaeological Association which has already taken a very large development, and is becoming very powerful. We have determined on holding an annual meeting or archaeological congress in the principal town, which is this year fixed at Canterbury, and which promises to be extremely successful. I am starting for Canterbury tomorrow, to take part in it. It has taken up much of my leisure time during the last few months. In order to give you some idea of what we are doing, I take the liberty of begging you will allow me to offer you a copy of our Quarterly Journal, of which I am the Editor.

I had the pleasure to send you some time ago an Essay on the State of the Villans or servants in England during the Middle Ages. I have an idea of enlarging this Essay, and continuing the plan by similar Essays on the other classes of

trinity, and publishing them in 2 for volumes.
I should wish prospectively to have your
kind permission to dedicate the book when
finished to you, as being in a way your
pupil in Historical Enquiries (though
a humble one); for your lectures on the
History of Civilization in France has always
served as the guide of my studies and director
of my studies. I shall therefore feel much
gratified by your own particular permission
for this dedication.
