My dear M. Guizot,
a thousand thanks for
your last volume. I have
been reading it with the
utmost pleasure & interest.
It interests me all the
more as it approaches
the times in which I took
much interest in French
affairs, which I did not
in the earlier years of my
London life, when my
attention was absorbed
by my profession & by the
enormous legal, commercial,

2 administrative reforms
which the long persistence
of a Tory unimproving rule
had rendered necessary.

It is also more interesting to
me as it is more personal,
& full of names of men
whom I know & some to
whom I admire.

But it breaks off just
at the most interesting
moment, your embassy
to London, then, for the
first time I entered your
society.

I am extremely much
by the affluence of which
it is full - but as for
another remark

that nations are sometimes
^{governed} by their likes, sometimes
by their fears. Is the
first case they are revolting
in the second, ~~consequently~~
~~rather~~, servile.

Join the 4th of Nov
maxims of international
law, L. 5, were generally
admitted. We had not
done a great nation
for claiming that it makes
wars for the sake of
ideas.
