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Trinity College Lodge, Nov. 15. 1822

My dear Sir I venture to recall myself to your
 recollection, although, however much I might have
 wished to do so, I should not have hesitated upon
 your time if I had not public business to excuse
 me. I have at present to hold the office of Vice-Chancellor
 the highest resident office in the University of
 Cambridge, and apply to you on the part of that body.
 In past years the University received from the French
 Government, presented by the Minister of Public In-
 struction, several volumes of the "Collection de
 Documents Historiques sur l'Histoire de France"; and
 the object of my present request is that the
 Government would be so kind as to continue their
 liberality to us, by allowing us to receive from them
 the volumes subsequent to those which we possess.
 We have at present eight volumes; beginning

with Journal & par Jean de Meuse, and ending
with Rapport & par Bourselin. I do not know
precisely what volumes have since been published
but you will conceive that the University is desirous
of proposing the whole collection.

Allow me to add that if it could be more
agreed to His Majesty, or to the Government
our wish you perceive that this application should
be made by the Duke of Northumberland or
Chancellor, or through any other channel that
you will, this will I do, as I am persuaded,
without hesitation.

But I would not omit the opportunity still
offered itself of receiving an acquaintance, which
short as it was, gave me so much pleasure. Per-
haps you will allow me to be so far to take for granted
your goodwill as to ask for your congratulations

on the position which I at present occupy. Her
Majesty has placed me at the head of Trinity College
a situation, I may venture to say, of honour and
importance; and this event took place, without the
smallest expectation on my part a week after
my marriage.

I have no doubt that the cause of literature
and of education has as great an interest for
you as ever. If in my present position, I can
in any way further your views of training
information on such subjects, or any other wishes
of yours it will be a matter of great pleasure
to me. — I do not wish to occupy too much of
your time, which is occupied in winning the
sympathy of all the wise and good of Europe,
as I wish to conclude.
